What service project would you have to work on to make it come true?

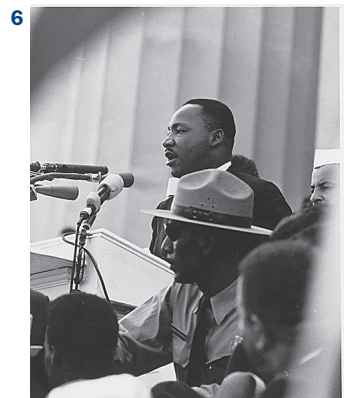
